“Chi Psi Taught me Three Valuable Lessons for Life”

Like many of you, I recently received an Alpha Epsilon Alumni survey. One question stood out to me: “How did your Chi Psi experience impact you personally and professionally?” Over time, the lessons I learned at the Lodge forty years ago have become so fundamental to how I relate to people. The three most valuable lessons I learned were to care for others, shoulder responsibility, and play win-win.

One of the people who taught me to care for others was **Pete “PV” Stynes, E'78**. I'd entered Michigan with high expectations for myself and was unsure if I could meet them. A few weeks after pledging, I realized that Pete, a senior with an outstanding GPA, had a class in the same lecture hall as me. He made a point of saying hello whenever he saw me and invited me to drop by the Lodge if I needed help or just wanted to hang out.

His concern made a lasting impression on me. He didn't have to care about me as a freshman pledge, but he welcomed me as a peer. I resolved that I'd support pledges and younger Brothers in his honor.

I moved into the Lodge in the fall of 1978. There was no organized meal service on the weekends, but the kitchen was open for use. Brothers were supposed to clean up after themselves, but lapses led to dirty pots and pans.

Lodge Manager **Steve Crow E'79** created a Kitchen Crew to clean the kitchen each Sunday night, and I volunteered. I had plenty of late Sunday nights working on assignments, but I never skipped my kitchen duty. It wasn't glamorous, but it needed to be

done, and I had a responsibility to the Brotherhood.

My senior year, I went on a Chi Psi Self Development retreat. In one exercise, I was paired with **Chris Laus, E'80**. I assumed Chris was my opponent and played to outscore him, but when the game concluded, the facilitator revealed that the objective of the game was to maximize the sum of the players' scores. Because I'd played selfishly, we scored poorly compared to other pairs. I learned that seeking a win-win outcome was a better way of engaging with others.

I have seen the value of these lessons in my career. In 1991, I started to work at Acuson, a major medical ultrasound manufacturer, joining their Sequoia project with the objective of achieving breakthrough performance. After four years of intense effort, our team fulfilled its objective. Physicians using a Sequoia system could see anatomical features that had never been seen with ultrasound before, and Scientific American magazine ran a two-page article on the project.

Sequoia taught me that engineering is a surprisingly social process. The team succeeded because we worked well together. We cared about each other's success, shouldered responsibility, and played win-win. Sound familiar?

A brief act of fellowship. A mundane weekly chore. A 15-minute exercise at a weekend retreat. Each seemed immaterial at the moment. And yet these experiences, which I would never have had in an impersonal dorm or an isolated apartment, prepared me to contribute to a system that changed patients' lives.

Can the Chi Psi experience impact future generations of Michigan students? It did for me. And to all those Brothers who contributed to my experience, I offer my deepest thanks.

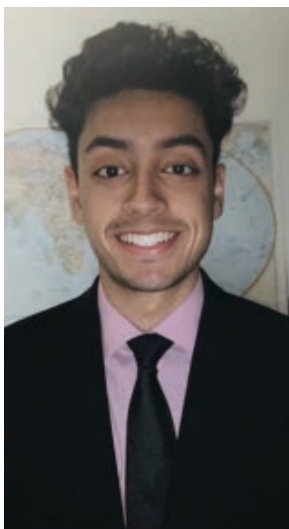

At our Program for Self-Development retreat, I remember sitting around a bonfire with all the guys, sharing our life stories. I was struck by the fact that even though all of us came from wildly different backgrounds and grew up in different environments, there was one common thread between us: we all had the same vision for the kind of men we wanted to be in the future, the leadership styles we wanted to embody, and the legacy we wanted to leave behind at Michigan.

Recently, we had a few

opportunities to meet several Michigan Chi Psi Alumni and to develop an understanding of what this idea of a real Brotherhood looked like. Being the oldest fraternity on campus, the sheer amount of history in the Lodge's halls made me realize that we'd stumbled on something so much greater than ourselves. The alumni talked a lot about the power of the Chi Psi network and the fact that Brothers always look out for each other, especially after their college years.

Watching everyone reminisce about their Chi Psi days and talk about stories from years ago as if they happened yesterday opened my eyes to what our group could eventually become through hard work and resilience. While this process won't be easy, I'm a firm believer in the fact that tremendous opportunity comes with tremendous responsibility. We're beyond excited to play a part in finally restoring Alpha Epsilon to what it once was.

Remembering Our Brothers



Rev. Chandler Corydon "Cory" Randall (1/22/1935 - 4/16/2021)

Cory attended UMich on a baseball scholarship and carried a full load of classes in addition to full-time work and active membership in Chi Psi. He earned an A.B. in History in 1957 and then studied for the priesthood in the Episcopal Church at Berkeley Divinity School, obtaining an S.T.B. degree in 1960 and later an honorary Doctor of Divinity from Yale in 1985. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop Crowley in 1960 and a priest in 1961. He entered the Hebrew Union - Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, earning a Ph.D. in 1969. Throughout his career, he was a revered spiritual leader.



Brother Robert Nissley, E'59 (10/7/1937 - 5/20/2021)

Bob was the President of Michigan Ladder Company in Ypsilanti for 45 years and served as a Past President of the American Ladder Institute. He was an active member of Chi Psi Fraternity and a man with deep Christian Faith. Fishing was a great passion for him especially when he was spending time on his boat named "Happyniss."
